


CELEBRATING THE POWER OF COMMUNITY

Helping Wood Ducks Thrive in Pend Oreille County

Once nearly wiped out in the early 20th century, wood ducks have made a remarkable comeback. One big reason? Nest boxes that give these colorful waterfowl safe places to raise their young.

Here in Pend Oreille County, the PUD helps keep the recovery going. As part of the Box Canyon Hydroelectric Project, we maintain more than 35 nest structures along the reservoir. We also work with local groups and landowners to create and enhance shoreline habitats that support healthy waterfowl populations.

Interested in helping? The PUD has a limited number of nest boxes available for cavity-nesting waterfowl and can provide technical support if you'd like to get involved.

STAY SAFE THIS FALL: DOWNED POWER LINES

Autumn brings colorful leaves, cooler weather, and unfortunately, more chances for downed power lines, especially here in Pend Oreille County, where we are surrounded by dense forests and towering trees. Falling branches, storms, and wet conditions can create hidden dangers.

Remember these safety tips if you see a downed power line:

- Stay back: Always assume a downed line is live. Keep at least 35 feet away (about the length of a school bus).
- Don't touch: Never touch a downed line, anything it's in contact with, or anyone nearby who may be in contact with it.
- Report it: Call 911 and the PUD immediately if you see a downed line.
- Drive carefully: Avoid driving over downed lines or flooded areas where lines may be hidden.

As the leaves fall in our beautiful tree-filled county, take a moment to remind your family and neighbors that safety comes first. When it comes to electricity, it's always better to be cautious.
